Natural Hazards, Conflicts and Disasters in the Himalaya

UCK warmly invite students and parents to this special free event, being hosted by the UCL Humanitarian Institute around the UN Sustainable Development Goals. Suitable for Year 12 and 13 students who have an interest in international development, the event will examine how natural hazards, conflict and disasters impact lives and livelihoods in the Himalaya and what lies ahead for the region. The Himalaya are a unique and hazardous environment, supplying water to 1.4 billion people but subject to global warming. The people of the Himalaya have witnessed some of the deadliest disasters in human history. The region is an epicentre of geopolitical turbulence with rivalry between the nuclear armed states, and on-going internal conflicts, border incursions and insurgency, which has led to communities being divided across borders and to increased migration. All these factors pose complex challenges for disaster reduction and development in the region. At the event, you'll find out about the history of disasters in the region, weather hazards and climate change, how countries manage resources across borders, and what makes people vulnerable to disaster risk, conflict and changes in society. We'll also look at the impact of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals.

With speakers from both the IRDR and the University of Kashmir, this is a fantastic opportunity to find out more about the region from those with local expertise. You will have the opportunity to ask questions and join the discussion about where the future of the region lies, and meet IRDR staff, students and people who work in the sector. I have been researching the publishing industry recently and have found a number of companies who say they offer work experience. There are sometimes age limitations but you might find these useful if you are looking at this particular career area.

Harper Collins – over 18s only

<u>Penguin Random House</u> – must be over 18's at point of placement. Quarterly applications. <u>Bloomsbury</u> – Internships have quarterly applications. Next quarter opens in March 2020. No aged restraints listed.

<u>Faber and Faber</u> – no work experience for school level. Look at <u>blog</u> for info about publishing. <u>Pan Macmillan</u> – no information on their careers pages. Have LinkedIn pages, maybe contact them through here.

Hodder and Stoughton – part of the Hachette Group. Need to be over 18.

<u>Dorling Kindersley</u> – Advertise work experience and no age limit suggested.

<u>The Society of Young Publishers</u> – website says they have work experience but not details given. To access the job vacancies you have to be a member but for a student this is currently £24pa. Might be worth investigating as useful on CV?

<u>Writers and Artists</u> Industry advice, information about careers and how to get into publishing and writing.

BookBrunch – news and reviews about books and everything connected to them.

<u>The Bookseller</u> – Lots of information about the various careers in the industry, plus events, blogs and more.

<u>The Publishers Association</u> – has a fantastic section on the various roles within the publishing industry. There is also a great blog and events section.
