### **UCAS** Deadlines - Reminder

Please ensure you check your UCAS Track for your UCAS deadline. For the majority of you it will be 18 June. This is the date by which you must choose your CF (1st) and CI (2nd) choice universities. Do contact me if you need to talk through your choices via email and I will set up an appointment online.

### Submission of documents

Please can I also remind all U6 students to check any deadlines they might have for submitting documents such as IELTS/English Language qualifications.

#### Accommodation

You will be able to apply for student accommodation at your chosen CF university, but only once you have made them your firm choice. Some universities also allow students who put them as their insurance choice to apply too. Please check each university website for more information. There are different deadlines at various universities at Southampton, applications are open from now until 1 August whereas Bristol open their system on 4 May and close it on 17 July. ### Creating a back-up plan to Medicine

When you apply to university in the UK, you apply though an organisation called UCAS, and every student is allowed to pick up to five courses/universities. When a student applies to study medicine, they are only allowed four medical school applications, with their fifth choice either a science related course or left blank. Because medicine courses are so competitive, this allows students to have a plan B in case they receive rejections from all four of their medicial school applications, which often happens. Students in the past often pick courses such as Biomedical Science or Biochemistry, many with the intention of applying to study postgraduate medicine once they have finished their first degree. Other pick universities, such as Newcastle, Leicester and Manchester who have schemes where you can transfer to Medicine after your first year studying some of their biomedical type courses. These are highly competitive but a possibility and certainly worth an investigation.

There is however, a third possibility that is often overlooked – degrees in the allied health professions and I wanted to share some of the information that I picked up at the 'Creating a back-up plan to Medicine' webinar that I attended just before half term. These webinars are being run several times

over the next few weeks and they are definitely worth watching, see <u>Allied</u> Health Professions to book.

Below are the roles which come under the banner of Allied Health Professionals (AHPs) and, with the exception of Art, Drama and Music Therapists, will give you a postgraduate route into Medicine currently, although many study these professions and choose to stay within their subject. One of the presenters, from the University of Sheffield, said in her twenty year experience she had only met 2 students who studied one of the AHP degrees, who then moved into postgrad medicine!

### The Allied Health Professions

Below are some of the bullet points from the webinar.

- AHPs provide treatment and help rehabilitate adults and children who are ill, have disabilities, injuries or special needs to live life to the full.
- The job market is very buoyant with over 90% of graduates working in a graduate related role in their chosen profession.
- Jobs are available in both NHS and private practice and many AHPs set up and run their own practices.
- Unlike medicine, the core hours are usually 9-5am, Monday to Friday.
- Lots of specialisms once qualified.
- Entry requirements are very varied from CCC and above.
- Non-repayable NHS grants of £5,000pa are available to all UK residents, so £15,000 over a three year course. NOT available for Music, Drama and Art therapists or Osteopaths.
- Additional £1,000pa available to Diagnostic Radiographers, Orthoptists,

Podiatrists, Prosthestists and Orthotists as well as Therapeutic Radiographers (£3,000 in total and non-repayable), as we have a shortage in these professions.

- Salaries in the NHS are based on the job band and start at £24,214pa and move upwards through the bands to £103,860pa for the top roles.
- Biomedical Science is a great way into Medicine too, but it does not give you patient contact in the same way as AHPs.
